

Milestones celebrated

More than 30 years of fundraising achievements have been celebrated as the Far North Queensland Hospital Foundation marked the 20th and 10th work anniversaries of Fundraising and Marketing Manager Glenys Duncombe and Communications Officer Robyn Rankin recently.

Ms Duncombe, whose local pedigree extends back several generations, attended Cairns West State School and she is proud to say, Trinity Bay High School.

Her journey in fundraising began with her daughter Renee's leukaemia diagnosis. This prompted Glenys and her whole family to start fundraising for the Leukemia Foundation.

After the tragic loss of Renee, Glenys became even more passionate and started working for the Leukemia Foundation. When the FNQHF position became available, she knew she was perfect for the role.

While not a "born and bred" local, Ms Rankin has proven her passion for health care and the region.

She came to the Foundation after 20 years in newspapers both here and elsewhere in regional Queensland and quickly adapted her skills to the role.

Her own health experiences, as well as supporting family members through the journey to end-of-life, have given her a unique perspective and compassion.

When we look back through the annual reports, we see that for the first one issued just after Ms Duncombe started, fundraising achieved \$392,000. Under her stewardship,

that figure has grown and this year the Foundation announced a figure achieved by fundraising of 10 times that amount.

Since then, she has led the fundraising team that has raised an incredible \$30.8 million.

Ms Duncombe rode the very first Cardiac Challenge. She took on the Wayne Leonard's Motorcycle Muster and helped drive fundraising to achieve \$1 million in the 19 years the event took place (And riding behind Mr Leonard into the Children's Ward at Cairns Hospital on a Harley Davidson!)

The personal friendships developed along the way have been an incredible source of strength and support and she is absolutely passionate about Far North Queenslanders and what we can achieve.

She strongly believes FNQ deserves the very best and if it's not provided for us, we can go out and do it for ourselves.

A heartfelt thank you goes out to the attendees, donors, and the Nu Nu Restaurant team, whose support and enthusiasm made the event such a resounding success. From fabulously feathered hats to dazzling pink ensembles, the luncheon was a true testament to the community's creativity and commitment

In a mark of the event's popularity, organisers announced that tickets sold out in just six minutes from go-live.

The Donate for DaNi campaign aims to ensure that patients in Far North Queensland have access to state-of-the-art surgical technology, reducing the need to travel for life-changing procedures.

NuNu co-owner Mo Rowbottom said the event, which sold out in six minutes, was a

great way to give back to the community.

"Today has been all about friends getting together, having lots of fun, in a beautiful

setting in FNQ and we get to showcase a bounty of amazing food and most importantly,

raise as much as we can for the Far North Queensland Hospital Foundation or DaNi the Surgical Robot," Ms Rowbottom said.

"We really need this robot. It is more precise, less invasive half the recovery time and better patient outcome."

The race day included a silent auction, fashions of the field competition, Melbourne Cup sweepstakes and the famous horse race on the beach.

Ex-racehorse The Mighty Mister Nibbles and his owner Danielle Jackman won the cup for the second year.

"He won his first one, we got pipped last year and were back this year," Ms Jackman said.

## Challenge pedals past \$326K

The 2024 QSuper Cardiac Challenge has united communities and raised more than \$326,000 to improve cardiac care for Far North Queenslanders.

This year marked the fifth anniversary of QSuper, part of Australian Retirement Trust, as the proud sponsor of this iconic event—a gruelling yet rewarding 333-kilometre ride from Cairns to Cooktown. To date, the QSuper Cardiac Challenge has raised an astounding \$6 million through the Far North Queensland Hospital Foundation, transforming cardiac care across the region.

The impact of these funds has been profound, supporting life-saving advancements such as cardiac catheter laboratories and cardiology imaging machines, ensuring regional Queenslanders have access to world-class care closer to home.

The top fundraising team was once again Annie's Army with \$36,760 followed by the Canardly's on \$22,119 and Cardiac Maniacs on \$21,020.

Top fundraising individuals were Nick Lyngcoln on \$20,197, Shaun Karran on \$11,000 and Sandy McEachan on \$8025.

Funds raised from this year's event will partly be used for a cardiac outreach vehicle as well as specialised beds, trolleys and imaging machines, to enable Cairnsbased clinicians to better service patients throughout the region.

This year's event brought together 195 cyclists, 100 volunteers, and 38 supporters—all united by a shared commitment to better health outcomes.

Australian Retirement Trust's Head of Government and Regions, Patrick Twomey, who also participated, reflected on the spirit of the event.

"The QSuper Cardiac Challenge highlights the power of communities coming together to create real change. It's an honour to be part of something that delivers hope and care to those who need it most," said Patrick.

Foundation CEO Gina Hogan praised the dedication of participants and the unwavering support from Australian Retirement Trust.

"The QSuper Cardiac Challenge is a shining example of what we can achieve when a community comes together for a common cause. The dedication of the cyclists, volunteers and supporters is nothing short of inspiring.



#### **Visionaries fund FNQ care**

The need for FNQ residents to have access to the best surgical technology, has been recognised by "part-time" locals, who have donated \$100,000 to the Far North Queensland Hospital Foundation's Donate for DaNi campaign.

The campaign is the Foundation's largest to date, with more than half the \$4.3 million target needed, already raised since launching in May this year.

Our visionary campaign to raise \$4.3 million for a surgical robot (aka DaNi), will revolutionise surgical care, enhancing precision, reducing recovery times, and improving outcomes for patients across our region. The state-of-the-art surgical robot replicates the surgeon's hand movements in real time. It lets surgeons perform complex procedures with

unmatched precision and control with minimally invasive techniques. This means smaller incisions, less pain, and quicker recovery times for patients.

Denise and Ellis Richardson (pictured), who spend part of the year in FNQ and the rest in Victoria, said they were motivated to donate for several reasons.

"Firstly, we believe that people in the Far North should have access to the best technology available and we know that technology helps attract the best doctors and those with the highest potential," Ellis Richardson said.

"We know the outcomes with the surgical robot are so much better and it's the future of surgical care," he said.

Denise Richardson, who was involved locally with the Look Good, Feel Better breast cancer program in the region for many years, said she had often seen




people have to travel elsewhere for treatment which was difficult for both the patient and their families.

#### Mossman

ALMOST \$200,000 worth of equipment to improve patient outcomes and ease the patient journey, has been handed over to Mossman Hospital.

Fundraising activities in the past 12 months by the Mossman Hospital Friends of the Foundation (a subsidiary of the Far North Queensland Hospital Foundation), resulted in numerous pieces of equipment being installed.

Mossman Friends President Deb Kachel said money for the purchases came from fundraising events such as high teas, lunches, trivia nights, barefoot bowls, as well as the raffles, sausage sizzles, sale of special merchandise, and carpark at the Mossman Show.

"The Mossman Hospital Friends of the Foundation volunteers are extremely grateful for the support of our amazing community; our local businesses and individuals who help us organise events and donate prizes, and community members

who attend our events and support our other fundraising efforts," Mrs Kachel said.

Chief among the equipment bought was more than \$72,000 worth of patient monitors, partly funded by an event at Hemingways Brewery Port Douglas, and the Mossman Hospital Friends of the Foundation.

Hospital, Acute and Aged Care Nurse Unit Manager Ruth Crimmins said the patient monitoring system upgrade in the Acute Ward was long awaited.

"This up-to-date tech will enable clinicians to see real time changes in the patient's condition from various areas of the hospital not just the bedside. It creates a safer environment for the patient and increases the capabilities of this hospital," Ms Crimmins said.

Mossman Oral Health Staff Dentist Dr Gerry de Waal expressed his gratitude for the \$53,836 new dental chair.

"Our patients have noticed and commented on our new chair and are just as grateful as the staff to have this modernised version. We look forward to treating patients with all the latest functions. Gerry and Shelley are a very Happy Dental Team," Dr de Waal said. Infusion Clinic Clinical Nurse Tanya Clarke

paid tribute to Mossman's Pink in the

Tropics and local branch of the Leukemia Foundation for donating a total of four infusion chairs to the service.

"Often patients are required to sit for long periods of time while receiving their infusion, these new chairs enhance patient comfort by offering various positions and swivels to maintain good circulation and finding the perfect patient fit," Ms Clarke said of the \$29,000 equipment.

"They also offer height adjustments for medical and nursing staff to perform procedures and overall improve patient outcomes. We could not be happier with this high-quality equipment thanks to the generous support of our local community care groups and Mossman Hospital Friends of the Foundation".

Director of Nursing & Midwifery & Facility Manager Peter LeGriffon paid tribute to the Mossman Rotary Club for donating the design and build of a sturdy gazebo structure through the Mossman Hospital Friends of the Foundation.

"Crafted for durability and all-weather use, it is now the centrepiece for an envisioned sensory garden setting and close by retreat for patients and visitors outside of the hospital space," Mr LeGriffon said of the \$25,000 gift.

A new exercise bike has been welcomed by clinicians and patients of the physiotherapy clinic.

Senior Physiotherapist Jonathon Papastamatis said the \$2329 bike was used almost daily to assess and rehabilitate patients across the cardiac rehabilitation program, physiotherapy outpatient service and in respiratory care.




